15th& 16th May at Sheffield Hallam University, Sheffield, UK

lan Rotherham and colleagues are organising a 2-day seminar to explore critical issues around wilding or re-wilding, landscape and ecological history, on nature and heritage conservation and on the impacts of current trends and major socio-economic changes. The seminar, which has a UK focus, addresses issues of funding, of skills, of best practice and of awareness in order to consider how conservation writ broad can respond to challenges of environmental change, of climate change, and of a radically altered public sector and political climate. It will set the scene for an international conference on a similar theme in September 2015. Speakers for 2014 include: Peter Taylor, Ken Smith (PDNPA), Professor Chris Thomas (Univ. Field Research Meeting: Glenfeshie Great Moss (MòineMhór), Cairngorms National Park w/c 09 June 2014

Organised by Dr Olivia Bragg, University of Dundee

We plan an intensive study of ecological processes, condition and restoration potential of the UK's highest-altitude peat bog (~950m a.s.l.). This meeting will be organised from Dundee University and bring together key UK peatland experts (especially on eroded blanket mire), plus around ten research students, for 3 days of fieldwork. The results will form the basis of a report on site status and potentially a cross-disciplinary peer-reviewed publication. Exact dates tbc, within the period June–August 2014. The seminar, organised by the Moors for the Future Partnership and Manchester Metropolitan University, will take place in central Manchester.

This one-day event will bring together practitioners, policy makers, researchers and students to share knowledge and best practice of the reintroduction of Sphagnum to upland peat bogs. Outcomes of the seminar will feed into a best practice guide.

The seminar is an opportunity to learn from the leaders in the field of conservation and land management on the application and monitoring of Sphagnum. It will include an update on the latest scientific research from Manchester Metropolitan University and the Moors for the Future Partnership, as well as a poster session and student workshop on early careers.

The Moors for the Future Partnership has pioneered the landscape-scale reintroduction of Sphagnum in the Peak District and South Pennines - the key aim of the MoorLIFE project is to protect active blanket bog in these areas, which will include the reintroduction of Sphagnum over an area of 650ha

Grassland Fungi and Waxcap Symposium

7th and 8th November at Sheffield Hallam University, Sheffield, UK

There is a 2-day event to explore issues around the identification and relationship of waxcap fungi (and their allies) to historical wood-pasture and parkland. This event is seen as both extending the scope of previous workshops, and to discuss their role as indicators and the implications for management of historic parklands and 're-wilding' landscapes. It will set the scene for further workshops and develop one of the themes for the 2016 international Capability Brown tercentenary

conference. The symposium includes a field visit to the Longshaw estate and concludes with an expert panel session.

The British Ecological Society and the French Ecology Society are pleased to invite you to Lille for a joint conference, which will bring together for the first time ecologists of our two countries. The aim of the conference will promote exchanges and debates on major advances in scientific ecology, and strengthen cooperation between the French and British researchers of tomorrow.

The meeting will be held from 9th to 12thDecember at the Grand Palais, Lille, France. Lille is the largest city in French Flanders; it is the principal city of the Lille Métropole, the fourth-largest metropolitan area in France after those of Paris, Lyon and Marseille. The city is situated on the Deûle River, near France's border with Belgium and is the capital of the Nord-Pas de Calais region and the prefecture of the Nord department.

It was the European Capital of Culture in 2004 and has a wide array of architectural styles, strongly influenced by Flemish design. There are many places of interest, including Lille Cathedral, the Citadel of Lille, Palais des Beaux-Arts de Lille and the Jardin botanique Nicolas Boulay botanical garden. The latter is one of three botanical gardens in Lille, the others being the Jardin des Plantes de Lille and the Jardin botanique de la Faculté de Pharmacie at the Université de Lille 2.

The Société Française d'Ecologie is a non-profit organization, established in 1968, of some 400 practicing ecologists and evolutionary biologists throughout France. The SFE's activities include promoting ecological and evolutionary research in France through the organisation and sponsorship of workshops and symposia, the funding of student grant schemes, the recognition of outstanding contributions to scientific advancement through various prizes, and the facilitation of communication between the research community, the general public and decision-makers.

A Life in Ecology – a celebration of the work and inspiration of Dr Oliver Gilbert pioneer ecologist

14th November 2015 at Sheffield Hallam University (and field visit / River Don lectures on 13th November) Sheffield, UK

It is ten years on from Ollie's premature death. This 2-day conference is being organised by Professor Ian Rotherham and Dr Paul Ardron both long-term friends and associates of the late Dr Oliver Gilbert to encompass his many interests and as a celebration of his contributions to urban ecology, lichenology, exotic plants, and urban and post-industrial landscapes over a period of 50 years. Invited speakers will deliver papers relating to topics, which reflect some of Oliver's many interests that included 'alien' species, lichens, urban woodlands, and the flora associated with post-industrial sites. Oliver was one of the first academic ecologists to look in detail at the urban environment and he established terms such as 'the urban commons', and his book *The Ecology of Urban Habitats* still stands alone as the primary text in this field. He also challenged much conventional thinking on the merits or otherwise of invasive aliens such as sycamore and Japanese knotweed. Along with George Barker, Oliver pioneered academic interest in urban habitats and in urban ecology.

Speakers confirmed so far include Penny Anderson, Dr Peter Shepherd, Rob Francis, Dr Peter Shaw, Professor Melvyn Jones and Dr John Barnatt.
